The last three countries mentioned are in the EEA, but are not members of the European Union (EU). Switzerland is not a member of the EEA neither of the EU, but does have similar rights.

Non-EEA students (non-European Economic Area students)

Explanation of the costs

a) Tuition fees for Non EEA-students	<p>Tuition fees for 2012-2013 have been set at € 8,595 for all non-EEA (European Economic Area*) students.</p> <p>Due to Dutch governmental policies, Hotelschool The Hague (and all other professional universities) are not funded by the Dutch government for the education of non-EEA students. Non-EEA students therefore pay higher tuition fees than EEA students.</p>
b) Skotel, training and study hotel	<p>The Skotel and catering practicals form an integral part of the curriculum. It is compulsory for students to stay at the Skotel (the training and study hotel) during the first year; either in Amsterdam or The Hague. The fee includes breakfast and one meal a day at school during 40 school weeks as well as access to the Internet during 45 weeks. After the first year students are required to make their own accommodation arrangements.</p> <p>These fees also include a deposit of € 250. This deposit is reserved for repairs of damage to Skotel property caused by students. This deposit is refunded after compensation of outstanding balances or damages upon departure from the Skotel.</p>
e)+f) Visa procedure	<p>Visa procedure Hotelschool The Hague</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Non-EEA students accepted for Hotelschool The Hague, academic year 2012-2013, are obliged to pay forthwith the total amount of € 18,555 to Hotelschool The Hague. After this amount has been received, Hotelschool The Hague will start the visa procedure immediately and inform the Immigration Department (IND) of the Ministry of Interior and Kingdom Relations. Hotelschool The Hague has made special arrangements with the IND to apply for a visa for non-EEA students via a shortened procedure. That means that you are not allowed to apply for a visa yourself. - When starting in August 2012 you need to have a residence permit for 12 months from 1 September 2012– 31 Augustus 2013, which is the official start and end of academic year 2012-2013. Arrangements will be made so that you can enter the Netherlands shortly before the first day of the introduction of Hotelschool The Hague. You will receive your residence permit after you have arrived in The Netherlands. - Five months before the new academic year starts on 1 September 2013 the Admissions Office / Visa Department will renew your visa with your cooperation for the year 2013-2014 (September 2013 until August 2014). Visa costs, withdrawn automatically from your bank account after your approval, are € 150.
Visa costs	<p>The costs include € 300 for a provisional residence permit (MVV) to enter The Netherlands (if applicable) and/or € 300 for a residence permit for one year. If you do not need a MVV you pay € 600 at once. In the first week of arrival at the beginning of the academic year students will be informed in full about how to obtain a residence permit, open a bank account, register at the City Hall and all other important matters related to becoming an official resident.</p>

Please note: there are some variable additional costs:

Computer/laptop	Although the school provides excellent computer facilities, we do advise students to purchase a laptop. Each student can log on to the school computer network by using their personal username & password as assigned by the IT Department. In other areas such as the Skotel rooms and foyer, there is a common Hotspot for Internet access via your own laptop or mobile phone, etc. The only requirement is that your device should be Internet capable & using standard TCP/IP Protocols and either using a normal network cable (patch cable) or WiFi.
Books	Books can be bought from the school's supplier. Other lesson materials consist mainly of a course guide that contains important information for each course, such as the number of EC's it provides, who the lecturers are, etc. Workbooks and manuals provide additional reading material to supplement the books. These course materials are available free of charge after your start on the school's intranet: www.myhotelschool.nl
Student expenditure for practicals	These average costs include uniforms, a scarf, badge, flag pin (for practicals) and a knife set and amount to approximately € 650.
